Update from Pastor Mark Middlekauff

How do we know if a church is "successful" or not? It can be hard to quantify. A church is not like a baseball team in which you can keep track of the wins and losses. Nor is a church like a publicly traded company. There are a number of metrics one can use to quantify if a company is successful. For some, return on investment is a helpful measurement tool. For others it may be a high dividend yield. But what about a church? How can we know if a church is "successful"? Is it the size of the weekly congregation? Size of the budget? We all know that bigger isn't always better. So then, what are the metrics for gauging if a church is doing well? After a few decades of ministry, I've come to see that there is one singular metric by which our Lord evaluates the "success" or faithfulness of all churches – Discipleship.

There are two important reasons why discipleship is the singular metric by which churches are to be assessed. The first reason is that discipleship was the number one priority of Jesus. Jesus discipled his disciples. Walked with them. Taught them. Challenged them. Encouraged them. Jesus also told them on the night before his death that "as the father has sent me, even so I am sending you." (John 20:21) And before ascending into heaven, Jesus's last words to his disciples was the command to "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20) Disciple making is the call upon every church and every Christian. Disciple making is more than evangelism. It is reaching the lost, baptizing them into the church, and then engaging them in purposeful, intimate, life-on-life mentoring.

The second reason why Discipleship is the singular metric of "success" is that it bears fruit in every way. Now some might wish to suggest other metrics for assessing a church. Do its member love others well? Do they serve their community? Are they faithful to attend worship services? Do they give sacrificially with great joy? Do they have a robust theology? Do they have strong leadership? Do they produce the fruit of the Spirit? All of these are good qualities to be found in "successful" churches. But if you ask the question, How do we instill all these qualities in the members of the body, the answer is what? Discipleship! Discipleship is the answer to every area of need in the body of Christ. Where properly pursued, discipleship addresses all the areas of growth that our Lord is looking for in his people. And this is why Jesus said, "Go and make disciples."

I am amazed at how long it took me, a pastor, to realize the priority of discipleship. I lament the years we've lost, but I am thankful the Lord now has us pursuing His great priority. Our GraceGroup discipleship program at Grace Church is such a joy to witness. God is growing us. We are maturing more and more as disciples. And it brings great joy to know that we are pursuing our Lord's number one priority. Discipleship is hard, and we have a long way to go, but thankfully we have our Lord's promise: "And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."
